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VISION:

To create healthy communities where youth are fully engaged and equal participants in society.

MISSION:

To reduce violence and build youth leadership in our community by increasing access to opportunities for marginalized youth.

OUR CAUSE:

Supporting young people as they grow strengthens our community, commerce, health and culture – the pillars of a vibrant city. However, one third of children, teens and young adults under the age of 24 live below the poverty line. Over half of Toronto's neighbourhoods are considered low-income and youth unemployment is at 20%, the highest rate our city has seen in decades. Difficulty in acquiring employment is compounded by the barriers that many young people living in low-income neighbourhoods face in realizing their educational potential.

Youth living in poverty are less likely to have access to nutritious foods and are at a high risk of dropping out of school. People living in poverty are at an increased risk of violence. For Youth Initiative (FYI) provides programs and services to youth living in low-income neighbourhoods in Toronto. Our goal is to end youth poverty by empowering youth with the tools they need to get ahead. We believe all young people deserve the opportunity to create successful futures.

In 2015, For Youth Initiative (FYI) made a big impact in Toronto by spending the third year of the 2013-16 Strategic Plan expressly focusing on achieving its goals of reducing youth violence, enhancing youth leadership and striving to become a thought leader by strengthening the organization's capacity and networks.

Due to the above efforts, FYI increased its impact and delivered the following successes.

The organization:

- Served 1180 youth directly through a wide range of programming and services.
- Enabled deserving youth to access college and university through thousands of dollars in scholarships. FYI's scholarship program has now provided over 28 scholarships to young people in low-income communities in Toronto. These young people are not only academically strong, but are gifted leaders in their schools and communities. This year, we would like to increase the amount of scholarships we provide to respond to the increasing need in our community. We know that post secondary education and training play a significant role in ending generational poverty.

CHAIR OF THE BOARD

- Hosted a back-to-school community barbecue where an estimated 700 people attended and 400 fully stocked backpacks were distributed to children and youth.
- Connected over 150 youth, young leaders, adult allies and youth-led initiatives through the highly successful, For Youth By Youth With Youth (FYBYWY) networking event.

For Youth Initiative ended 2015 saying goodbye to its long-time Executive Director, Lekan Olawoye, and began 2016 welcoming its new Executive Director, Shaneeza Nazseer Ally.

Shaneeza has been a part of the FYI family since 201. She's lead FYI's Fundraising and Skilled Volunteer Engagement initiatives and managed our Capacity Building programs through the CORE Department. She returns to FYI with a plethora of corporate and non-profit experience and a remarkable set of leadership skills to guide the organization to new heights.

The organization is currently developing its next 2016-2019 strategic plan and it is with the utmost joy that we announce that FYI's new leader was recently awarded the Toronto Foundation's Vital People award which supports professional development of rising nonprofit leaders. This grant will better position Shaneeza to lead the upcoming strategic planning process and help For Youth Initiative grow responsibly and sustainably.

FYI'S YOUTH DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

Youth Ambassador Leadership Program

This program uses an evidence-based wraparound support model for youth to increase leadership abilities and skills while decreasing disengagement. Youth are encouraged to lead community-building initiatives to build their own leadership skills. Additionally, youth work with FYI staff to develop tailored goals for their own self-development while also being connected to a mentor and local community services to support their access to employment, education, family support, & social isolation reduction.

Girl Group

FYI's girls group is girl talk with a twist. We encourage young women to have open and honest conversation about occurrences in their lives and we use those occurrences (good or bad) to empower them and mold them into leaders. Our program is designed to help young women dig deep and express themselves the best way they know how. We also strengthen them with tools to develop new methods of self-expression. Our goal is to ensure that they develop a healthy dose of self-esteem and self-confidence. We believe that with that combination, they will be able to tackle any curve-ball life throws at them.

Drop-Ins

Sometimes young people just want to have fun. There is no better day than Friday for some friendly ping pong competition right next to a very intense Jenga competition. Drop-In Fridays are designed for the youth to unwind from the stressful week of homework, tests and assignments. They are able to participate in a range of activities from board games to choreographed dancing and sometimes a short movie.

RISE- Youth Justice Program

R.I.S.E. uses an evidence-based wraparound support model for youth in conflict with the law to increase leadership abilities and skills so as to prevent and intervene in youth violence. This program focuses on four areas: work and career, education, family wellbeing and social life. Youth participate in dynamic group discussions, inspiring activities, tailored support systems and fun trips around the city.

Homework Club/ Power Study:

We all know how difficult some high school classes can be. The homework club is powered by tutors from nearby colleges and universities, as well as retired teachers. Youth get support to complete homework and work on other assignments and projects. We also go on power mode during exams. We study hard to make sure we are ready to "Ace" every exam!

Studio Program

The studio gives participants a chance to explore first-hand the exciting world of music production in a fully functional production and recording environment. Participants of any skill level can work alongside experienced peer mentors to develop their musical abilities. The program is a positive and artistic outlet for youth to express themselves and showcase their musical talent.

FYI'S CORE DEPARTMENT

THE CENTRE FOR ORGANIZATIONAL RESILIENCE

The Centre for Organizational Resilience (CORE) at FYI strives to build the capacity of grassroots youth-led initiatives. CORE supports youth-led initiative/organizational staff and leadership to develop managerial skills, knowledge, and networks required to build organizational effectiveness and leadership capacity. CORE's end goal is to support youth-led organizations and young leaders to make positive impact and lasting change in their communities so they can have a stronger voice in the broader civic arena, and become life-long leaders in the non-profit sector.

CORE's current services:

Knowledge Exchange Meetup (KEM): To equip young leaders with how to effectively run and sustain their initiative/organization through a series of skill-building workshops

One-on-one coaching/mentorship: To discuss roadblocks, facilitate introductions, share resources, ask questions about workshop materials, sector practice, or related systems, seek feedback on emerging ideas, and develop strategies and plans to tackle challenges

Network development: To create opportunities for grassroots youth-led initiatives/organizations to connect with peer leaders, as well as diverse adult allies, key stakeholders and community members in order to reflect, share challenges, and exchange ideas and strategies for success.

Online toolkits: Many grassroots youth-led initiatives/organizations outside the GTA are in need of organizational capacity building support. In order to respond to the existing needs, CORE team has developed multiple online toolkits, with hopes of providing universal access for any groups

Skilled-Volunteer matching: To connect grassroots youth-led initiatives with skilled-volunteers who can support organizational capacity building goals. CORE team provides matching support with the intention of building trusting relationship between two parties

Administrative Support Partnership (ASP): To provide grassroots youth-led initiatives with administrative support to ensure the integrity of project implementation and financial management
